2. Go to Pay Dues/Death Fund Online

3.1st time going to the dues/ death fund:

- *Your username is your Card Number.
- *Your initial password is your last name and the last four digits of your SSN.
- * You will be required to change your password on your first login.
- 4. Verify that your mailing address and phone number is correct. The Grayed out areas you can not change. Then Save the information.
- 5. Go to the Dues Drop Down Box. Select Dues Paid.
- 6. Choose the Amount that you want to pay. If you are part of the death fund. The current count shows what we have paid out since the death fund went to the LPX software. The paid thru on the death fund is the total that you have paid thru. You have to subtract the death count from your total. That will give you the total you have left. Also, If you have paid for 7 death funds the next count would be 8 and that would only Charge \$5.00.
- 7. Review the total charges before you hit pay charges to ensure you are paying what you wanted to.
- 8. Enter all of the information that matches the credit/ debit card that you are paying with.
- 9. Then hit next. You will get a confirmation that it went through. Once it has been approved it goes to the software and will notify the office that we need to send the dues receipt.

I hope this letter finds you and your family well. I am writing you today to discuss a few of the benefits of being an IBEW member. Did you know that as an IBEW member you can work at home or travel anywhere in the U.S for work without filling out an application? Did you know that no matter where you work your health insurance and retirement benefits follow you with no need to change providers? Where ever you go to work the wages and benefits are guaranteed by a contract between the workers and the contractors. You do not have to try and negotiate or wonder what you will be paid.

With many trades now facing a growing work picture we at the IBEW have a lot local projects and projects across the United State that need to be manned by skilled tradespeople. The IBEW offers you the opportunity to receive high wages, a safe work environment, pensions, an annuity (401k) and some of the best health insurance benefits available today. The whole family health insurance provided to local 449 members is paid for by the employer, has a \$400.00 deductible per person and covers your entire family. If guaranteed wages and benefits with the flexibility to work other places is something that interests you, please feel free to contact us. We will be happy to answer any and all of your questions about taking your career to the next level. Please feel free to call us with any questions you may have. We will be happy to assist you in any manner we can.

With work picking up, I would like to remind everyone about 449's Incentive Program. This will help 449 organize new journeymen and experienced apprentices. So, we can staff all the current and future work in our jurisdiction and thus maintain and grow our market share. Any qualified State licensed Journeyman electrician, who becomes a member under the Commercial/Industrial Agreement or the Residential Agreement will receive a total of \$1,500.00 for joining Local 449, or \$750.00 for an apprentice who has over 4000 hours. State of Idaho verified work hours. \$1,500.00 will be paid to qualified State licensed Journeyman electrician after the new member works for an IBEW Local 449 signatory contractor for 4 months or 600 hours, or \$750.00 will be paid to apprentices after an Idaho State registered apprentice applies to the JATC program and works for an IBEW Local 449 signatory contractor for 4 months or 600 hours, and the new member states that a current IBEW Local 449 member referred the new members of the IBEW do not qualify. If the new member states that a current IBEW Local 449 member referred the new member works for an IBEW Local 449 to join, or an experienced apprentice to the JATC for direct entry, the current member will receive \$500.00, paid after the new member works for an IBEW Local 449 signatory contractor for 1 month (150 hours). To receive this \$500.00 the current member must be a member in good standing of IBEW Local 449. - The current member cannot be a staff member of the IBEW Local 449, or a staff member at any other IBEW Local or a contractor.

We need to take a hard look at internal and external organizing in the last 5 years the JATC has turned out 47 new Journeyman. 101 Journeymen have retired in the previous 5 years. Over the next 5 years 105

of our members will retire. Our local needs your help! Please talk to every open shop hand you know and let them know about the union and what we have to offer. If you would like to help, please contact Dan or myself. Check out 449s new website. Sameworkbetterpay.com/local-449

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Solidarity and collective action have always been the bedrock of labor unions, and today, we bring you an inspiring story from our fellow union, the Teamsters. They recently secured a historic raise in their new contract through a powerful strike action.

In our last newsletter, we highlighted the Coeur d'Alene miners' strike in the 1890s, underscoring the enduring spirit of workers united for justice. Today, the Teamsters' success serves as a testament to the power of unity.

The Teamsters, known for their determination, sought to negotiate a new contract that fairly compensated their hard work.
